Office of Sustainability F.A.Q. Guide for Faculty and IAS

Where is the Office of Sustainability located?

- The Office of Sustainability is located in room 25K, North Hall which is in the basement of North Hall next to the Risk Management Office.

Who can use the Office of Sustainability?

Anyone! Thanks to Student Government, the office is now accessible with a card reader. People
interested in using the office should coordinate with Mark Klapatch, as he will keep the master
calendar of the space and has the authority to grant card access. Student workers and volunteers
intermittently staff the office throughout each week.

Does the Office of Sustainability present in classes or give tours?

- Yes, the Office of Sustainability has a variety of presentations and tours prepared:
 - Current presentations include an overview of campus sustainability, an update on the Sustainable Campus Community Plan, and how we measure sustainability progress.
 Presentations can be customized to relate to each course.
 - General campus tours focusing on the sustainability aspects of our physical campus. A virtual tour (power point) is also available in the event of inclement weather.
 - o Tours of Ames Suites which is LEED gold certified and is the most sustainable UWRF building
 - Presentation/tour of the RDI solar installation
 - Tours of the campus heating plant

Does the Office of Sustainability need anything?

- The Office of Sustainability has a few bookshelves where we intend to have a resource library of sustainability related books. If you have any extra copies or old books you would like to donate, we would be happy to have them!

Does the Office of Sustainability provide any trainings to campus?

- Yes, the Office of Sustainability offers departmental training sessions. These sessions focus on several items that get missed during employee onboarding including: information on trash and recycling operations on campus as well as shredding events, room security, conserving energy in classrooms and offices, classroom capacities, emergency egress, and a brief overview of sustainability at UWRF. The sessions will take about 30 minutes. Please contact Mark Klapatch if you are interested.

I would like to host a film showing or bring a speaker to campus but do not have funds. Can the Office of Sustainability help?

- The Office of Sustainability does not currently have funding for activities like this. However, the staff regularly collaborate with student organizations to host film showings or bring speakers to campus. In fact, student organizations are often looking for ideas. Work with Mark Klapatch to get connected!

 - Stormwater Management policy, plan, or guidelines using green infrastructure and low impact development practices to mitigate stormwater runoff projects
 - Sustainable Campus Community Plan This was created in 2012 so it needs to be updated.
 Courses could help with this by focusing on individual sections or the report as a whole.

 - Sustainability Ethics Students will gain a grounding in the interrelated nature of social, economic, and environmental issues, as related to views of interdependence, resource allocation, and environmental justice
 - Sustainability Praxis Students will be able to analyze, articulate, and envision solutions to problems of sustainability, integrating knowledge data across disciplinary boundaries.
 - Global Citizenship Students will internalize and understanding of the consequences of their social, economic, and environmental choices, and the possibilities for taking action on the personal and public levels.
- Consider conducting a sustainability literacy assessment for your course/program. Mark Klapatch can provide sample questions and examples of sustainability literacy assessments. If you conduct some form of a sustainability literacy assessment, it must be a pre and post assessment and must be reported to Mark as well so he report on that in future STARS reports.
